"In 1926, after the strange disappearance of both Grimsby and Streaper, the company ceased operations. The building was boarded up and fenced in. Over the years, new shops and stores were built in front of it and it was mostly forgotten.

"In 1991, Ripley's acquired the property

and demolished the buildings that had been built in front of it. Until further notice, Ripley's will be conducting tours of the old factory, pending a decision on how to further develop this valu-

Tickets are \$12.99 plus tax for ages 12 and older and \$7.99 plus tax for ages 6-11.

No one younger than the age of 6 is allowed due to the graphic nature of the facility, and those younger than 12 must be accompanied by a guardian.

Just because you're tight on cash this year doesn't mean that you can't have a fun summer getaway.

If you have \$250, plus a full tank of gas, you can get away for a night or two and have tons of fun. Tennessee's oldest town, Jonesborough, is only

two hours away from Knoxville, and it has many charms that are worth checking out. The Historic Eureka Inn is in the heart of this

lovely town, and has room rates starting at \$109 a

Rooms are decorated in rich colors and antique furnishings.

Even though it's a historic inn, each guest room has modern conveniences such as DSL Internet and cable television.

Expansive gardens and a gazebo make for a beautiful place to spend the afternoon reading.

The inn offers packages that include accommodations plus bonuses such as a gourmet dinner for two and tickets to a play. Another package includes dinner and a carriage ride. Both packages are extremely affordable.

Because Jonesborough is home of the National Storytelling Conference, it makes perfect sense that visitors would be interested in storytelling yearround. Positive Solutions, a tour company, hosts Strolling and Stories sessions at 10 a.m. Monday through Saturday.

Or if you prefer ghostly and mysterious stories, you may want to attend Legends, Whispers and Mysteries at 7 p.m. on the last Thursday of each month. Tours depart from the Jonesborough Visitors Center. Tickets are \$12 per person.


A tighter budget trip would still allow you to explore the town, looking for antiques and admiring the town's architecture.

Plus, you can visit the the Jonesborough/Washington County History Museum for free. The museum features archives, photographs and artifacts that show important parts of the city's history from the 1850s to the 1980s.

The museum is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. Although admission is free, donations are accepted.

Since this is a budget-conscious vacation, you may be relieved to know that there are plenty of fast food and casual dining restaurants.

But you must treat yourself to a nice meal at least



once on your trip and have a taste of local flavor. Bistro 105 seems to be a favorite among visitors and locals alike.

Two people can enjoy a trip to Jonesborough for less than \$250 total if you stay at the Historic Eureka Inn for one night, eat fast food for most of their meals, take a ghost or storytelling tour and keep the souvenir buying to a minimum.

To get to Jonesborough from Knoxville, take I-40 East to I-81 North toward Bristol. Take the TN-93 South Exit toward Jonesborough. Turn left onto TN-93 South. Turn right onto Oak Grove Avenue. Turn left onto West Main Street, and turn left onto North Cherokee Street.
